Weather Related Late Starts and Early Dismissals

November will be full of activities for sixth graders in literature class! As the first quarter comes to an end, we will wrap up our unit on the book *Among the Hidden*. We will then focus on specific literary terms and devices that authors commonly use within literature. Additionally, we will begin working on our first quarter book shares, explaining the plot lines of a favorite book to classmates. The students have been reading some intriguing books, and I look forward to hearing about these!

One of my favorite units to teach will begin in November: a non-fiction unit centering around young heroes. In addition to learning about Malala, a 15 year-old girl who stood up to a deadly terrorist group in Pakistan and also won the 2014 Nobel Peace Prize, we will also learn about other young people who have faced adversity and positively affected those around them. During this time, students will work on close reading skills, finding the central idea, and using text evidence.

I encourage students to continue reading daily and recording their pages on their reading logs. Most students are doing a nice job at this and enjoy the freedom to read books of their own choosing. I will be challenging the students to read from different genres second quarter in order to expose them to different authors and types of books. Please encourage your child in this area! 6th Grade World History

We have finished up all of our material for the Ancient Egypt Unit, and the kids are going to put all of their knowledge to the test with a unit test. 7th Grade Literature

First quarter is quickly wrapping up. It's hard to believe that we are this far into the school year already. We have completed many units and have learned a great deal.

We have just finished up learning the last of the fiction signposts and are eager to put them to use. We will begin working on our fiction signpost project where the students will identify the signposts from their individual reading book. After this project, we will incorporate signposts through the rest of the year in order to identify different things from text.

In the first quarter we have also finished up our book project. For this quarter we wrote a letter to an author or character about a book they wrote and the impact the book had on their lives. The students did a great job sharing their favorite parts of the book and what grabbed them in as readers. I was very impressed with the questions the students had for the author/ character.

Currently, we are wrapping up our first unit of Greek/Latin root fixes. The students have studied the roots as part of a word and are able to identify the meaning of others based on finding the root. We have three units in total to complete and will pick up with more vocabulary in later spring. In our next short unit we will be studying conflicts and the different types of conflicts found in stories. From here we will read a couple of stories and practice identifying conflicts. The next big unit we are on that takes us up to Christmas break. This unit will focus on identifying bias writing. The bias unit is very thought-provoking and will challenge the students to be open as readers but still critical of everything they read. I am looking forward to see how the students respond and what they will take away from this unit.

7th Grade English

The seventh graders have been learning all about sentences in English class. They started with simple and compound sentences, making sure they know how to find the subjects and verbs and how to check if a sentence is complete. Next, the students moved on to learn about complex sentences. They worked hard with much repetition, so they are able to use different kinds of sentences in writing. Varying the kinds of sentences in writing creates fluency, which makes writing flow and enjoyable to read.

We are close to finishing our study and practice of sentence writing, and next we will move on to reviewing and learning some new things about capitalization. The capitalization unit is not very long, so after the capitalization test, we will move on to. . . punctuation. This tends to be the most dreaded element of our English language, but we will accept the challenge by taking on the most challenging punctuation mark first—the comma. After commas, we will continue to learn about other punctuation and its correct use in our writing. At the end of the punctuation unit, there will be final test, but the actual test will be if they are able to punctuate their own writing correctly. This "test" will occur for the rest of the year as we continue to write. The reason we learn how to correctly use punctuation is to make our writing easier to read and understand.

7th Grade Science

Why do I have blue eyes? Why do you have brown hair? Can you roll your tongue? The 7th graders have been investigating the answers to these questions along with our Big Question: Why do offspring with the same parents look different? During science class as part of the Genetics and Heredity Unit. Each Team has been exploring various traits that they have inherited from their parents and comparing those traits with their teammates. During this unit, we have been conducting investigations to isolate DNA from various fruits, determine the importance of DNA in expressing who we are, and predict the probability of various genotypes and phenotypes for potential offspring. Within the unit on genetics, we have also been looking at the occurrence of mutations and its effects on different organisms. Students have been gaining a better understanding of the common mutations that they may have or find around them in nature while determining if those mutations pose a potential harmful, beneficial, or neutral effect. Finally, we explored the new area of science, epigenetics, to see how much the environment plays a factor in the genetics and growth of various organisms.

In November the 7th graders will be exploring the vastness of space while working to answer our new Big Question: "How can we predict eclipses?" in the Earth, in the Universe Unit. To help us find the answer to this question, the 7th graders will be tracking the phases of the moon each day to analyze its effect on the probability of eclipses. Each class will also examine movement of the Earth, Sun, and Moon and its importance to Lunar and Solar Eclipses and the various phases of the Moon. To gain a better understanding of how the movement of the Earth, Sun, and Moon create these phenomenon, we will be making our own actual eclipses and moon phases using a 3-D "moon" and light source.



8th Grade Literature

In 8th grade literature, we are currently reading *The Outsiders* by S.E. Hinton. Throughout the book we will be working on reading strategies and signposts, which help us make connections, inference, synthesize and determine the importance of the text. Since the book is filled with action and many teenage applicable life issues, we have had great class discussion. Students have been divided into teams of 3 to 4 and are given team roles in which they need to prepare and bring to their conversations. The discussion roles focus on students generating higher-order discussion questions, making connections, and determining important passages in the book. The following is a list of five essential questions we are processing throughout the book:

- 1. How do social groups play a part in school?
- 2. How does someone's appearance affect how others view him or her?
- 3. How do you define the word "family"? Does a family mean different things to different people?
- 4. What do you think contributes to violence or bullying among teenagers? What can be done to prevent teen violence or bullying?

After finishing the book, we will be watching the video and writing a final essay. I believe watching the video is a great way for students to compare the visual image of a movie to the visual image they have created in their mind while reading the book. During this novel I have been proud of their willingness to think deeply and wrestle with difficult questions.

Finally, I want to continue stressing the importance of independent reading. Practicing and learning to enjoy reading is absolutely essential to improved reading rate, accuracy, and comprehension. I want to encourage parents to engage their child in a conversation about *The Outsiders* or an independent reading book.



8th Grade English

We have tackled and mastered troublesome words! Words such as to, too, and two. There, they're, and their. Quiet and quite. Accept and except. Students did a fantastic job learning these words. We are now working on applying their knowledge and skills in real situations; this is more of a challenge.

Up next? Students are reviewing KU Sentence writing strategies and refining their knowledge of compound, complex, and compound-complex sentence construction. This short unit will prove invaluable as students continue to write for English and other content area classes. One of our writing pieces during this review is a Preposition Poem. It's pretty easy to write, but does ask kids to reflect and focus on an event or space that's important to them. Fun to read!

We've used our Chromebooks in many ways in English. We have completed bell ringer reviews, written our rough drafts, worked collaboratively on revising and editing our pieces of writing, and we've used a program called NoRedInk for reviewing and learning new grammar and writing concepts. This program allows students to practice their grammar and writing skills related to their personal interests like sports, celebrities, and music. Even more, NoRedInk provides immediate feedback and differentiated lessons for those needing more or less practice on a concept. Students work at a pace set by them. Tutorials are provided when learners get "stuck". Mistakes are corrected and students go on! Each student has an account connected to mine, and I can track progress on homework, practice, and quizzes. NoRedInk has already proven to be a fantastic resource for our students! In addition to NoRedInk, students find the Google Classroom works well for taking spelling tests, reviewing for tests and quizzes, and for getting information / instruction from teachers! Quizlet has been a great program to use to create reviews for tests. The Chromebooks are pieces of educational equipment and have been a true blessing for which we are super grateful!

Whenever students are absent (be it a whole day or just for an appointment), we as a team ask that they (and you, as parents, too) consult the website for a list of assignments made. Additionally, many of us post information right into Google Classroom. Students should also be checking this resource when absent. Thanks for working with us to stay caught up and "in the know".



"Our Corner of History"

8th Grade Science

In 8th grade, we have transitioned from Earth science to the new Next Generation Science Standards. We will not be using a textbook but rather using multiple resources to guide us through our different topics. Much of what we will be using will be accessible through Google Classroom and the Internet.

"How has natural processes and human activities changed Earth's climate?

The eighth graders just finished up exploring our changing climate. We used NASA's websites that have been tracking a variety climate-related topics. We noticed several trends that have been occurring since the Industrial Revolution. First, of all the greenhouse gases, carbon dioxide has experienced the most change. Second, globally, the northern hemisphere's temperature has risen the most. Third, our glaciers are melting at a very fast paste and that our natural "air conditioning" may be gone and very difficult to replace. We researched natural causes of CO_2 emissions to see if they have significantly caused changes. Lastly, we explored options that each and every one of us can do to reduce our impact. After all, small steps make big changes.

"How do we track the changes of organisms over time?"

We are just delving into fossil formation, how fossils become exposed, what clues fossils give us about the past, and how fossils are similar and yet diverse. We will explore how fossils show that animals change due to a variety of reasons, such as; devasting destruction of habitat, extinction of prey, plate tectonics, and more.

In November, the 8th grade science classes will be synthesizing information about how technologies have influenced the inheritance of desired traits in organisms.

Most of the students are completing their homework on time. Homework is a <u>vital</u> part of classroom instruction and reinforcement. I am very appreciative of you reminding your son / daughter to be responsible young adults. Thanks!
