- 5. Seek First to Understand, Then to be Understood Listen before you talk
- 6. Synergize Together is better
- 7. Sharpen the Saw Balance feels best
- 8. Find Your Voice Effectiveness to Greatness



6th Grade Literature . . . READ All About It!

I truly enjoy getting to know each new crew of sixth graders with all their unique personalities. The students are at the point where they understand our procedures and routines, and I am thankful for their past teachers who have taught them so much! In literature class, the students have been learning about the different types of text and even developed their own "bookshelf" of books they would like to read this school year. I especially like when they share book ideas for ME to read.

Our literature class is divided up into three main areas of learning: individual reading, vocabulary, and the current unit. For **individual reading**, I expect the students to record five entries each week on their reading logs with approximately a total of 80 pages. Time is provided in class each day to record reading from the day before. Additionally, students made individual goals and are working hard to reach them each week. Please encourage your child to read about 30 minutes daily; this will help them reach their goals and our class goals.

Our second main area of learning is **vocabulary**. During the first quarter of school, we will study words from the book *Among the Hidden* by Margaret Peterson Haddix. We work quite hard at figuring out the words' meanings by looking at the **context** in which they are used. We will have two to three quizzes over these vocabulary words with a final test at the end of the unit. Quizlet is an online program we often use to review and study our vocabulary words, and it can be used at home as well. In addition to the words in our text, we will also begin studying different word parts including prefixes, roots, and suffixes.

The third area of learning within our literature class involves the **current unit** (topic). A few of these will include novel units, middle ages literature, nonfiction/research, and poetry. Our current unit is a novel unit over the book *Among the Hidden*. During this unit, we will review the elements of fiction, point of view, and learn the stages of plot within a book all while working on comprehension skills. Students will create a plot hill and keep notes on the different characters. We will also plan to compare the population law in the book to that of China as we read some related non-fiction articles. The book's main character, Luke, is a third child in his family in a society which only allows two children per family. Throughout the course of the book, he meets another illegal third child who wants to change the population law by staging a rally at the President's house. Luke needs to make a decision . . . will he dare to make a change or sit back and let others do it for him? This is the first book in a series of six. Please ask your child what is currently happening in the book; it might spark some interesting conversations!

What a Variety in 6th Grade English!

Here is the overview of sixth grade English. We do lots of different things every week, in fact, every day! You have hopefully seen examples of all these things.

Most every week we will do spelling. We take a spelling pretest on Mondays, and the students practice the words they missed for Tuesday. On Wednesday we do a worksheet to help us analyze how the words fit into the same pattern. Finally, on Fridays we take another test over the words; that score goes in the grade book.

Most days we also touch on a grammar skill. We begin to understand why it is important to follow the standards of our language when communicating. Texting language only works because we all first understand the basics of standard English. There will be many short, intense grammar units throughout the year; each ends with a formal "test" that needs to be passed with proficiency to meet the benchmark.

Finally, all of these skills come together in writing projects. The focus of sixth grade English is to help your student become a confident writer. Though he/she may never pursue writing as a career, they will feel comfortable enough to tackle whatever writing assignments come their way. We do many, many drafts of pieces. Some of those will be finished, published pieces; others will remain drafts.

You can help your child by checking in with them often. They will also need help studying for spelling and grammar tests and revising and editing their writing. 6th Grade Science

Since the beginning of the school year, the 6th grade students have adapted well to the middle school setting. Science is much different than other subjects in the fact that we do a lot of handson activities with unique objects that they normally would not use in a classroom setting. Therefore, it is very important that we understand how to act in a lab setting to ensure that no one is injured in the science classroom. After understanding the "why" behind behaving well in my class, we practiced gathering data by using observation skills and the metric system. The 6th graders are now able to find length, volume, temperature, and mass of certain objects using the metric system.

After our lab safety unit, lab materials unit, and our measurement unit, we jumped into the Engineering Design Process. We are learning about the process by creating and designing their own catapults. The EDP is a great way to practice measurements, reading data, problem solving, teamwork, and working in a safe lab environment.

After the Engineering Design Process unit, we will jump into the realm of physical science. **What's to Come?**

Understanding what makes everything up, what are atoms made up of? How do 100 atoms off of the periodic table create everything we see in the world today? What are chemical changes? How do particles move based on the state of matter they are in? How does this change with pressure? Temperature?



7th Grade English

Welcome to 7th grade English. My name is Linda VanRegenmorter, but I'm more commonly known as Mrs. VR. I have started my 32nd year of teaching 7th grade English, and 31 of those years have been in the MOC-FV Middle School! It has been a fantastic start to the school year! I'd like to thank you for helping your child have the necessary supplies for English class—a green binder with 5 dividers inside, loose leaf paper, pens and pencils. These supplies really make English class run more smoothly, and more importantly, they help your child stay organized and be successful in English class.

Let's talk about what has been happening in 7th grade English. The school year started with explanations about spelling, DEP (Daily Editing Practice), bell ringers, class procedures and expectations, etc. In 7th grade students have a list of 25 spelling words each week, and the test over all 25 words will be on Fridays, unless we have a shortened week. Then the test will be on the last day of that week. The final spelling tests at the end of the week are worth 70% of your student's spelling grade, so it is very important that they study the words and are prepared for the final tests at the end of each week

After taking care of all the beginning-of-the-year business, we moved on to the "Listening Unit." Students learned the difference between hearing and listening, evaluated their own listening, learned strategies to improve their listening, and did some listening activities. Of course, one of the unit's goals is to have students use what they learned about listening in all their classes during the school year.

Since completing the "Listening Unit," we have moved onto the "Sentence Structure Unit." Writing in complete sentences and varying our sentence structures for fluency is the basis for all writing; therefore, it is only logical that we start with this unit. The three middle school English teachers have attended classes to learn a curriculum for teaching students how to write complete sentences and use a variety of sentences when they write. The method used is called the "KU Sentence Writing Strategy." It starts with the basics and then moves students on to more complex sentences. With the use of the "KU Sentence Writing Strategy," I hope to see students improve their writing by having complete, correctly written sentences.

Thank you for taking the time to read the middle school monthly newsletter. The newsletter is a great way for you to stay informed of what's happening in 7th grade English and in the middle school. I'm anxious to see this year's 7th graders improve their use of the English language as we progress through this school year.



7th Grade Math

7th Grade Literature

It's been an exciting start to 7th grade Literature! We have spent a great deal of time getting to know each other and working through class expectations. Each class section has been great! Some things we will be doing this year are 6 main units and 6 small units. Our 6 main units will take up about a month of time each and our 6 small units we fill in between units. Our most challenging unit is our "Bias" unit and the unit the students are most looking forward to is "Fear Can Do What?" Skills we will be building on are vocabulary, characterization, conflicts, using evidence in writing, analysis, answering tough questions, and compare and contrast.

We started the year out by working with understanding characters in a story and reading a story called "7th Grade." After this mini unit we entered into our nonfiction signpost unit. We have completed all the notes for nonfiction signposts and have spent a great deal of time practicing identifying them and making sense of what we have learned from the text. After nonfiction we moved on to the six fiction signposts. Students are currently working on the final project for fiction signposts to wrap up this unit. The next unit is answering our first tough question of "Is there ever truth in fiction?" In this unit we will use two stories and personal accounts to support thinking. Students will be able to share their reasoning and find evidence to support their reasoning.

The students have also been given the Quarter 1 reading goal of 2-3 books or 300 pages. This helps them get reading and will lead us into our quarter 1 book project. Students will complete a book project each month over a book they have read in that quarter. Other reading projects we complete throughout the year is a genre log challenging students to read one book from a variety of genres.

We have also started a new book sharing on Friday's called First Chapter Friday. Each Friday we read aloud as a class a chapter out of a book from various genres. Students can write down the titles and check out these books at the end of the day if they are interested. We also have guest speakers coming to read and share books with the students. So far this year students have heard chapters from realistic fiction, historical fiction, mystery, biography, and nonfiction. I am looking forward to a fun and amazing year with a great group of 7th graders!



Wieking's World 7th Grade Global Studies

We're off and running! It's always good to be back in school and back into a routine. I am very thankful to be working at MOC-FV with our wonderful students and staff. Each year I am impressed with the creativity and thoughtfulness of our students.

Our 7th grade social studies class is called Global Studies. It is a study of contemporary issues and their connections to past events. The issues we address and discuss in class are real world issues that people and nations around the world are dealing with. We also spend time in class asking questions and searching for answers. We practice evaluating sources and checking them for their reliability.

In the coming weeks we will examine some foundational concepts before discovery different regions of the world. We will explore different government systems, religions, and economic systems and identify what makes up our culture.

7th Grade Science

In October, the 7th graders will be exploring the vastness of space in our Earth's Place in the Universe Unit. To kick off our exploration, we will be investigating our Big Question, "How can we predict eclipses?" To help us find the answer to this question, the 7th graders will track the phases of the moon each day to analyze its effect on the probability of eclipses. This will lead to our discussion about the movement of the Earth, Sun, and Moon and its importance to Lunar and Solar Eclipses and the various phases of the Moon to prepare for the Partial Solar Eclipse October 25th and the Total Lunar Eclipse November 7th. To gain a better understanding of how the movement of the Earth, Sun, and Moon create these phenomena, we will create actual eclipses and moon phases using a 3-D "moon" and light source.

The focus of our exploration will then shift to what lies beyond the Earth, Sun, and Moon within our own Solar System. The 7th graders will read various scientific articles to better understand what lies beyond Earth, our Solar System, the Milky Way Galaxy, and out into the universe. To analyze how small the Earth truly is in comparison to the Sun and the rest of space, each class period will create their own Solar System Scale Model.

Finally, the 7th graders will end their journey with a virtual trip to the Grand Canyon to explore the various rock formations and fossils to understand how scientists determine the age of the Earth.



8th Grade English

8th Grade Science

Biodiversity in Ecosystems around the World

The eighth graders have settled into the school routine and things seem to be going FANTASTIC!!

For the first couple of weeks in science, the 8th graders have spent time reviewing lab equipment, lab safety, and using basic lab equipment. These are basic skills necessary to function in a science classroom.

We are following the Next Generation Science Standards. We will not be using a textbook but rather using multiple resources to guide us through our different topics. Much of what we will be using will be accessible through Google Classroom and the Internet.

Our current topic is biodiversity. Students have been placed into groups based on their ecosystem models they explored & created at the end of 7th grade. The teams have decided on an actual ecosystem somewhere in the world to delve into. They currently are spending time learning about the abiotic, biotic, limiting factors, and how humans impact their ecosystem in positive and negative ways. To wrap up the unit, the teams will put together a poster to hang in the hallway for everyone to view. If you get a chance to stop by, feel free to check them out during conference time.

The next short unit will be focused on how our climate is changing and how those changes are impacting various ecosystems.

By mid-October, the 8th graders will be delving into fossils formation, how fossils become exposed, what clues fossils give us about the past, and how fossils are similar and yet diverse. We will explore how fossils show that animals change due to a variety of reasons, such as devastating destruction of habitat, extinction of prey, plate tectonics, and more. We will also discuss ways humans have genetically changed organisms to create desired traits and how this may affect our world.

A BIG thank you to goes out to the students & parents who are making sure that the homework is completed on time. Homework is a vital part of classroom instruction and reinforcement. I am very appreciative of you reminding your son / daughter to fill in their planners and become responsible young adults.

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8th Grade Literature

I am enjoying these first weeks of school and settling into a new classroom routine at MOC-Floyd Valley Middle School. Although new to the district, I have been teaching Reading and English/Language Arts to middle and high school students for the past seven years. I earned my Bachelor's degree from Buena Vista University. Since graduating, I have added 5-12 English/ Language Arts and K-8 and 5-12 Reading Endorsements. I am grateful for the opportunity to share my love of reading with your child.

One area of focus these first few weeks has been creating an independent reading routine. I want students to read independently each day and build that time into their daily schedule. The goal is to increase reading interest in different genres, improve vocabulary, increase background knowledge, and increase reading stamina. Please encourage your child to keep reading and find a genre they enjoy.

Another focus has been vocabulary. This year, students will study several roots, prefixes, and suffixes. Morphological awareness provides a tool for improving many areas of literacy: vocabulary comprehension, reading aloud, spelling, phonological awareness, and reading comprehension. We have already had competitions to see who can create the most words and construct new ones that could be added to the dictionary.

Lastly, we have been reviewing the six Notice and Note Fiction Signposts for close reading. We have been using *A Long Walk to Water* by Linda Sue Park as a sample text to find and utilize these signposts while reading to dig deeper into the text. Students have been stopping and asking these questions to think about what the author is saying. These strategies help create attentive readers who look closely at the text, interpret it responsibly, and reflect the connection to their own lives.

We will be starting our first novel unit soon. We will be reading *The Outsiders* by S.E. Hinton. This book takes place in Oklahoma during the 1960s. To begin, we will watch short video clips about the 1960s and read articles on real-world problems from the book. During this novel we will focus on literary elements and reading comprehension strategies. I am excited to begin this novel and discuss real-world issues with your child.

Thank you for the opportunity to teach your child, and I look forward to meeting you in the future.
