6th Grade Literature . . . READ All About It!

The sixth graders are off and running! It has been another exciting start to the school year, and I have finally mastered all the students' names! So far in literature class, the students have been learning about the different types of text and even developed their own "bookshelf" of books they would like to read this school year. Each student should have a list of at least 8-10 new books to check out.

It is important to understand the structure of our literature class as it is different than in past years. Our class is divided up into three main areas of learning: individual reading, vocabulary, and the current unit. For **individual reading**, I expect the students to record five entries each week on their reading logs with approximately a total of 80 pages. Time is provided in class each day to record their reading from the day before. Additionally, students made individual goals and are working hard to reach them each week. Please encourage your child to read about 30 minutes daily; this will help reach their goals and our class goals.

Our second main area of learning is **vocabulary**. During the first quarter of school, we will study words from the book *Among the Hidden* by Margaret Peterson Haddix. We work quite hard at figuring out the words' meanings by looking at the **context** in which they are used. We will have two to three quizzes over these vocabulary words with a final test at the end of the unit. Quizlet is an online program we often use to review and study our vocabulary words, and it can be used at home as well. In addition to the words in our text, we will also begin studying different word parts including prefixes, roots, bases, and suffixes (morphology).

The third area of learning within our literature class involves the **current unit** (topic). A few of these will include novel units, literature set in the middle ages, nonfiction/research, and poetry. Our current unit is a novel unit over the book *Among the Hidden*. During this unit, we will review the elements of fiction, point of view, and learn the stages of plot within a book all while working on comprehension skills. Students will create a plot hill and keep notes on the different characters. We will also plan to compare/contrast the population law in the book to that of China as we read some related non-fiction articles. The book's main character, Luke, is a third child in his family in a society which only allows two children per family. Throughout the course of the book, he meets another illegal third child who wants to change the population law by staging a rally at the President's house. Luke needs to decide . . . will he dare to make a change or sit back and let others do it for him? This ties in nicely to our Leader in Me discussion during STAR as well! Please ask your child what is currently happening in the book; it might spark some interesting conversations!



6th Grade World History

What a great first quarter we've had in sixth grade World History! Our Egyptian Unit is going to be finished up with a fun project of building ancient sarcophagus coffin boxes. We've got some very creative minds and hands in sixth grade! The creativity will not stop there. Our next unit will be a discussion over the "Fertile Crescent" of Ancient Mesopotamia. We talk about rivers and seas and plateaus. We will also discuss what Mesopotamia city-states looked like and how they functioned. Our big project with this coming unit will be designing a city-state of our own. We get to use Legos, cardboard, and even Minecraft in this project. The kids always put such a great effort into their group project, and it's going to be a lot of fun to see the presentations of their work! It's been so fun to get to know this new group of sixth graders, make sure you ask them about social studies when you get a chance!



What a Variety in 6th Grade English!

Here is the overview of sixth grade English. We do lots of different things every week, in fact, every day! You have hopefully seen examples of all these things.

Most every week we will do spelling. We take a spelling pretest on Mondays, and the students practice the words they missed for Tuesday. On Wednesday we do a worksheet to help us analyze how the words fit into the same pattern. Finally, on Fridays we take another test over the words; that score goes in the grade book.

Most days we also touch on a grammar skill. We begin to understand why it is important to follow the standards of our language when communicating. Texting language only works because we all first understand the basics of standard English. There will be many short, intense grammar units throughout the year; each ends with a formal "test" that needs to be passed with proficiency to meet the benchmark.

Finally, all of these skills come together in writing projects. The focus of sixth grade English is to help your student become a confident writer. Though he/she may never pursue writing as a career, they will feel comfortable enough to tackle whatever writing assignments come their way. We do many, many drafts of pieces. Some of those will be finished, published pieces; others will remain drafts.

You can help your child by checking in with them often. They will also need help studying for spelling and grammar tests and revising and editing their writing. Parents of Sixth Grade Math Students

The sixth grade students have been doing a great job in Math Class. We have been working our way through Unit 1: Geometry. They have been finding the area of triangles, parallelograms, rectangles, squares, and some other kind of "odd" shapes. We will continue this unit to find the volume and surface area of rectangular prisms.

There are a few items I wanted to explain to you, in case I can answer any questions. **Study Island**: This is an online platform that I utilize to expand our math knowledge. Each study island assignment comes with a lesson to teach the students and some game or practice sessions to allow the students opportunities to practice skills. Each session is ten questions and students must get a 70% or higher to pass (earn a blue ribbon). This is their only homework they should be doing outside of class.

Cooldowns: These are a quick one to three questions "quiz" designed for me to check an individual skill. Cooldowns are worth 10% of their overall grade and can be retaken once if a perfect score is not achieved on the first attempt.

Quizzes: A more major assessment, usually in the middle of the unit over a variety of topics. Quizzes make up 30% of the overall grade. Quizzes can also be retaken one time.

Tests/End of Unit Summative Assessments: The final and most major part of a student's grade. The summative assessment should measure the amount of material mastered from the entire unit. This makes up 60% of the overall math grade. Typically, after the test, students will inspect and correct their mistakes for $\frac{1}{2}$ credit. Retakes available upon parent request.

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6th Grade Science

Since the beginning of the school year, the sixth grade students have adapted well to the middle school setting. Science is much different than other subjects in that we do many hands-on activities with unique objects that they normally would not use in a classroom setting. Therefore, we must understand how to act in a lab setting to ensure that no one is injured in the science classroom. After understanding the "why" behind behaving well in my class, we practiced gathering data by using observation skills, and the metric system. The sixth graders can now find the length, volume, temperature, and mass of certain objects using the metric system.

We have just begun the engineering design process. We are learning about the process by creating and designing our catapults. The EDP is a great way to practice measurements, reading data, problem solving, teamwork, and working in a safe lab environment.

After the Engineering Design Process unit, we will jump into the realm of physical science. **What's to Come?**

Understanding what makes everything up, what are atoms made up of? How do 100 atoms off of the periodic table create everything we see in the world today? What are chemical changes? How do particles move based on the state of matter they are in? How does this change with pressure? Temperature?



7th Grade Literature

It's been an exciting start to seventh grade Literature! We have spent a great deal of time getting to know each other and working through class expectations. Each class section has been great! A quick outlook on the year and things we will be doing are we have six main units and six small units. Our six main units will take up about a month of time each and our six small units we fill in between units. Our most challenging unit is our "Evaluation of Arguments" unit and the unit the students are most looking forward to is, "Fear Can Do What?" Skills we will be building on are vocabulary, characterization, conflicts, using evidence in writing, analysis, answering tough guestions, and compare and contrast.

We started the year out by working with understanding characters in a story and reading a story called *Seventh Grade*. After this unit we will be covering the essential question, "What can we learn from other generations?" For this question we will be reading one short story and three poems with different lessons that can be learned from different generations. Throughout the year we will do different vocabulary lessons once a week focusing on a specific word part. Quarter 1 we will be studying prefixes and will cover six different prefixes. Vocabulary units will consist of learning what the prefix means, seeing example words, reading a story with a variety of words, a vocabulary activity, and ending the week with a quiz.

The students have also been given the Quarter 1 reading goal of two to three books or 400 pages. This helps them get reading and will lead us into our Quarter 1 book project. Students will complete a book log each month over a book they have read in that quarter. Other reading projects we complete throughout the year is a genre log challenging students to read one book from a variety of genres.

We have also started a new book sharing on Friday's called First Chapter Friday. Each Friday we read aloud as a class a chapter out of a book from various genres. Students can write down the titles and check out these books at the end of the day if they are interested. We also have guest speakers coming to read and share books with the students. So far this year students have heard chapters from realistic fiction, historical fiction, and a nonfiction graphic novel!

I am looking forward to a fun and amazing year with seventh graders!

7th Grade English

Welcome to seventh grade English. My name is Linda VanRegenmorter, but I'm more commonly known as Mrs. VR. I have started my 33rd year of teaching seventh grade English, and 32 of those years have been in the MOC-FV Middle School! It has been a fantastic start to the school year! I'd like to thank you for helping your child have the necessary supplies for English class—a green binder with five dividers inside, loose leaf paper, pens and pencils. These supplies really make English class run more smoothly, and more importantly, they help your child stay organized and be successful in English class.

Let's talk about what has been happening in seventh grade English. The school year started with explanations about spelling, DEP (Daily Editing Practice), bell ringers, class procedures and expectations, etc. In seventh grade students have a list of 25 spelling words each week, and the test over all 25 words will be on Fridays, unless we have a shortened week. During the week, students have two assignments that help them work with the words and learn their spelling. One is a spelling morphology assignment, and the other is a spelling assignment in Google Classroom. Then the test is on the last day of that week. The final spelling tests at the end of the week are worth 70% of your student's spelling grade, so it is very important that they study the words and are prepared for the final tests at the end of each week.

After taking care of all the beginning-of-the-year business, we moved on to the "Listening Unit." Students learned the difference between hearing and listening, evaluated their own listening, learned strategies to improve their listening, and did some listening activities. Of course, one of the unit's goals is to have students use what they learned about listening in all their classes during the school year.

Since completing the "Listening Unit," we have moved onto the "Sentence Structure Unit." Writing in complete sentences and varying our sentence structures for fluency is the basis for all writing; therefore, it is only logical that we start with this unit. The three middle school English teachers have attended classes to learn a curriculum for teaching students how to write complete sentences and use a variety of sentences when they write. The method used is called the "KU Sentence Writing Strategy". It starts with the basics and then moves students on to more complex sentences. With the use of the "KU Sentence Writing Strategy," I hope to see students improve their writing by having complete, correctly written sentences.

Thank you for taking the time to read the middle school monthly newsletter. The newsletter is a great way for you to stay informed of what's happening in seventh grade English and in the middle school. I'm anxious to see this year's seventh graders improve their use of the English language as we progress through this school year.

Wieking's World 7th Grade Global Studies

Our seventh grade social studies class is called <u>Global Studies</u>. It is a study of contemporary issues and their connections to past events. We also spend time in class asking questions and searching for answers. We practice evaluating sources and checking them for their reliability. In the coming weeks, we will examine some foundational concepts before discovering different regions of the world. We will explore different government systems, religions, and economic systems and identify what makes up our culture.

7th Grade Science

In October the seventh graders will be exploring the vastness of space in our Earth's Place in the Universe Unit. To kick off our exploration, we will be investigating our Big Question, "How can we predict eclipses?" To help us find the answer to this question, the seventh graders will track the phases of the moon each day to analyze its effect on the probability of eclipses. This will lead to our discussion about the movement of the Earth, Sun, and Moon and its importance to Lunar and Solar Eclipses and the various phases of the Moon to prepare for the Annular Solar Eclipse on October 2nd. To gain a better understanding of how the movement of the Earth, Sun, and Moon create this phenomenon, we will create actual eclipses and moon phases using a 3-D "moon" and light source.

The focus of our exploration will then shift to what lies beyond the Earth, Sun, and Moon within our own Solar System. The seventh graders will read various scientific articles to better understand what lies beyond Earth, our Solar System, the Milky Way Galaxy, and out into the universe. To analyze how small the Earth truly is in comparison to the Sun and the rest of space, each class period will create their own Solar System Scale Model.

Finally, the seventh graders will end their journey with a virtual trip to the Grand Canyon to explore the various rock formations and fossils to understand how scientists determine the age of the Earth.

8th Grade Literature

The first few weeks have flown by at MOC-Floyd Valley Middle School. I am enjoying getting to know this new group and am impressed by how well they are transitioning into their leadership role as eighth graders. I feel fortunate to be able to share my love of reading with your child and look forward to a great year in the Literature classroom.

One area of focus these first few weeks has been creating an independent reading routine. I want students to read independently each day and build that time into their daily schedule. The goal is to increase reading interest in different genres, improve vocabulary, increase background knowledge, and increase reading stamina. Please encourage your child to keep reading and find a genre they enjoy.

Another focus has been vocabulary. This year, students will study several roots, prefixes, and suffixes. Morphological awareness provides a tool for improving many areas of literacy: vocabulary comprehension, reading aloud, spelling, phonological awareness, and reading comprehension. We will practice these skills using different activities throughout the year.

Lastly, we have been reviewing the six Notice and Note Fiction Signposts for close reading. We have been using *A Long Walk to Water* by Linda Sue Park as a sample text to find and utilize these signposts while reading to dig deeper into the text. Students have been stopping and asking these questions to think about what the author is saying. These strategies help create attentive readers who look closely at the text, interpret it responsibly, and reflect the connection to their own lives.

We will be starting our first novel unit soon. We will be reading *The Outsiders* by S.E. Hinton. This book takes place in Oklahoma during the 1960s. To begin, students will complete a web quest, watch short video clips about the 1960s, and read articles on real-world problems from the book. During this novel we will focus on literary elements and reading comprehension strategies. I am excited to begin this novel and discuss real-world issues with your child.

Thank you for the opportunity to teach your child. I look forward to an outstanding year.

What is Leader in Me?

Leader in Me is a program designed to show students how to become the best they can be by being "leaders" within their own lives and eventually leaders of others. The program uses Sean Covey's principles of highly effective teens. Based on the principles introduced in the lessons, the eight Habits become the real life skills and tools students can rely on during their journey through Middle School, High School, and eventually adulthood. The eight Habits outlined in Leader in Me include:

- 1. Be Proactive You're in charge
- 2. Begin With the End in Mind Have a plan
- 3. Put First Things First Work first, then play
- 4. Think Win-Win Everyone can win
- 5. Seek First to Understand, Then to be Understood Listen before you talk
- 6. Synergize Together is better
- 7. Sharpen the Saw Balance feels best
- 8. Find Your Voice Effectiveness to greatness

To kick off the year, the Middle School students started by discussing what leadership may look like and how our paradigms, or perceptions, can influence our choices. Then, the Middle School students began working on **Habit 1: Be Proactive**. Habit 1 focused on "Taking Responsibility for Your Own Life" with key concepts such as:

- Pushing Pause before responding or reacting
- Using Proactive language vs. Reactive language
- Recognizing our Circle of Control
- Stepping out of our Comfort Zone
- · Choosing your own "weather" or attitude



What is PBIS?

Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) is a tiered framework for supporting students' behavior, academic, social, emotional, and mental health. PBIS creates a positive, predictable, equitable, and safe learning environment for students and staff.
