

- 1. Make sure your children missed early due to the are dressed warmly. We weather make sure your have recess outside unless the wind-chill is below zero so make sure your child has a hat, mittens (the thin kind aren't warm enough), a warm coat, and boots. Boots and snow pants are required anytime there is snow or water on our play-
- ground. A change of socks in the backpack is a great idea as the children's socks always seem to get wet. Also an extra set of mittens is good so they can wear a dry pair for their next recess.
- 2. When school is dischildren understand where they are to go. We always have a few students who don't know if it's grandma's house or the daycare service they need to go to so have a plan in place and make sure your child knows what it is.


Please remember that you can, at anytime, contact your child's teacher if you have questions or concerns. We are always willing to set up a time if you feel the need to talk.

Spelling words are as inevitable as taxes. So how can you help your child deal with this weekly task without feeling like it's *your* homework? Use the following process to make your children responsible for their learning:

- Day One. For each word on the spelling list, your child says the word and spells it aloud while looking at it. Then he writes the word while looking at it.
- Day Two. Your child repeats the steps for Day One.
- Day Three. Your child looks at and says each word, but covers up words while writing themtesting his memory. He checks his spelling and writes each misspelled word correctly three times.
- Day Four. You give your child a verbal practice test. He again checks his own work and writes misspelled words correctly three times.

Responsible children are more likely to succeed

Kids who learn to be responsible do better in school. They get along better with teachers and peers. They make better decisions. They're more apt to try, follow through and succeed.

To teach your child responsibility, be sure to:

- Practice what you preach. For example, you can't expect your child not to use foul language if you do.
- Help your child see how his actions affect others. Develop a habit of reflection with questions like, "How do you think Jose felt when you said that?". "If someone hits you, how do you feel about him?"
- Use discipline to teach, not punish. Always talk about what your child might do differently next time.
- Enforce consequences regularly. In advance, be clear about what will happen when your child doesn't follow the rules. Then follow through.
- Remind your child of lessons learned in the past. "Remember when Eric pushed you? Remember how we talked about your walking away, then later telling him how you felt?"

Stay calm when you encounter defiant behavior

There are times when even the most mild-mannered child gets defiant. You don't have to wonder what she's going to do-she'll tell you. When a child acts defiant, it's easy for a parent to lose control. You're angry. You're confused. And of course, you're worried about the future.

Here's how to control your own reactions so you can stop your child's defiance:

- 1. Stay calm. You told her to study because she has a math test. It's important. Look her right in the eye. Put a hand on her shoulder if you need to. Then say again, in a calm voice, "It's time to study." The calmer you are the more forceful you'll be.
- **2. Let her know** the consequences. Remember, these can be positive. "When you're done studying, we can watch your favorite video."
- **3. Pick your battles.** It's okay to say, "You have made me think about what I said. Taking these clothes up to your room right now is not that important. But when it is, I expect you to do what I ask."
